

# Battell's Offer to Vermont.

That Joseph Battell of Middlebury has virtually made an offer to give the State of Vermont the summit of Camel's Hump is the interpretation of a letter which he addressed to the Burlington Free Press yesterday. Mr. Battell stated that he thinks that the Hump should become the property of the State and as its owner he will be pleased to deed it over 'if a few preliminary reg-ulations can be arranged for preserving its beauty, so far as that can be done now after several unfortunate fires, and That Joseph Battell of Middlebury has now after several unfortunate fires, and for constructing roads so as to make the mountain accessible to all of our citi-zens, and visitors as well." Besides the scenic attractions of the summit of this noble mountain, it contains quite an extensive timber tract, which might be made the basis for a forest preserve in accordance with the new policy adopted by the legislature. That being the case, the State would very likely comply with the regulations which Mr. Battell might see fit to specify, as to preserving the natural beauties of the place and to building a traversable road to the summit. Travel by horse to the summit will never be a pleasure in and of itself; but a road could be constructed which would permit of carriage traffic, nearly as sat-isfactory as to the top of Mount Mansfield, while at the same time horseback riding would be less of a discomfort than carriage riding. In the old days there was a horseback route to the summit of the Hump, but latterly that mode of travel has given way to pedestrianism ; and even though the hardships of walking to the summit are quite severe, an increasing number of people are making the trip each summer. They are entranced by the beauties unfolded before them at the rugged summit, be-ing more than repaid for their exertion. It is certainly one of Vermont's grand, beauty spots and is deserving of more beauty spots and is deserving of more prominence than is now accorded it. The proposed gift of the summit to the State of Vermont, with the attendant regulations which Mr. Battell might impose, would popularize the place greatly. Such regulations as Mr. Bat-tell mentioned in his letter to the Free Dense, would be accentable, no doubt Press would be acceptable, no doubt. Asparagus And Strawberries Being Raised On A Large Scale To Supply Fresh Edibles-For This Territory. **Raspberries To Be Added.** 


A much needed industry which is now being rapidly developed in this vicinity is the brack gardening business of McNall and Arkley, which is now able to supply the tables of the entire section with good things to eat in season. Not only is Water-bury and the immediate vicinity being taken care of in this respect but goods are being shipped to Montpelier and other places. J. R. Arkley con-ducted the business for a number of years and this season L. N. McNall has entered the business with him and the result is that the plans for the future are even more ambitious than in the past.

Asparagus is one of the principal items raised and the amount to be placed on the market is large. Two thousand new plants have been set out this year in addition to the old bed near the river in Duxbury and siderable size.



# FRANK & ANNA GROW



Remembering Frank and Anna Grow

As a young lad I had fond memories of both Frank and Anna. Frank was a quiet man, tall, handsome, and a friend to all. During his productive life he was a mechanic by trade and was well known in the music field as a whale of a violinist. He was a native of Glover and migrated to this area as a young man during the federal CCC's to work on the Waterbury dam project.

Anna and some of her family came here from the northern part of Vermont in about 1935 and they purchased a small farm in Duxbury Corner. Her father's name was Louis Messier Sr. and he farmed here before the corner was developed. Their farmhouse was on the inside of the actual corner; now it is #378 Main Street, where William and Sara Whitehair now reside. Anna's younger siblings that also grew up here were Theresa and Louis Jr. "Bud" Messier. Anna also had three older siblings: Bessie, Ubaldine and Phyllis.

The barn was attached to the farmhouse during the farm operation until Louis Sr. died in an accident that was farm related. Louis Sr.'s widow Ida (Lumbra) and their daughter Theresa lived here for the next several years.

### FRANK & ΑΝΝΑ GROW

After the dam project, Frank was employed by W.E. Collins in his Ford garage as a mechanic. He met Anna and they were married in the late 1930's. Eventually they purchased a home in Duxbury Corner. Currently, this home is listed as #448 Main Street and is located two houses east of where she grew up. They were blessed with one child, a daughter they named Lucretia Ann, but everyone knew her as Luann.

Frank and his brother-in-law, "Bud," went into partnership by purchasing a garage on South Main Street in Waterbury, as both were cracker-jack Ford mechanics. As a young guy I well remember some of those days at their garage. Usually on Sunday afternoons a bunch of us would end up there to wash our cars and chat with either Frank or Bud, whoever was on duty. At that era, Bud had just finished a stock car to race at Thunder Road. Of course that was a prime subject for all of us. His yellow and black #50 was a Ford (3 window coupe) with a modified straight eight Lincoln flathead engine. Bud was as proud of this as a peacock so he embellished our presence as he worked on his Lincoln powered #50! I can still recall Bud working on the stock car as he quietly sang to himself, "Does your chewing gum lose its flavor on the bedpost overnight."

On a quiet Sunday afternoon, we would drive into the garage. Some of the older guys were there with their beautiful, shining new cars, like the Sweetser boys—Bernard with a 1956 two door hardtop and in two tone (pink and black), then Bob with his 1956, also Ford exactly like Bernard's except his was white with a black top. Then in would come

Willsie Williams with his brand new 1957 Studebaker "Golden Hawk." Then myself (and other young guys) with all we could afford--my 1953 Merc with my accessories like a rust bucket with bondo-filled fenders. But we all had a great time drooling over #50 on Sunday afternoons in the garage and then on Thursday nights at Thunder Road cheering on Bud's driver (Larry Granger) and #50 as he wheeled around the high banks at Thunder Road.

Another great adventure that we had was with the Grow family when Frank, Anna, and Luann had a band along with Howard Lamos who played the guitar. This band played for round and square dances at both Moretown and Duxbury Grange halls. They played regularly at the Town Hall in Warren every Saturday night for several years. Anna played the piano, while Frank played his famous violin, Howard was on guitar, and Luann often sang. The locals responded here on Saturday nights as grand response for this popular band. In my mind and I am of sure of others: this surely exemplifies: "these were the good old days."

Anna was a homemaker, with her usual daily tasks plus raising Luann. After that she became more involved with town affairs and community involvements. She was active in the "Hill N Dale" club that sponsored local charities. She was also for many years a ballot clerk for her town during elections, a Justice of the Peace, and town auditor for Duxbury along with her (and our) friend Iola Atwood. One unusual task that she did for many years was to be a messenger for the Duxbury Corner School as she was the only available neighbor that had a telephone near the school. She would take a message from a student's parent and walk to school and deliver a message to the appropriate teacher. This was Anna--she did her best to be good neighbor and friend. Anna, my hat goes off to you and Lord knows, we need more people like you today.
